From Overwhelm to Orientation

- Kim Warman recounts her first teaching job—receiving minimal training, no mentor, and a desk full of Post-it notes.
- Despite her classical training and degree, she faced serious confusion and isolation.
- She eventually found stability and support through an informal mentorship with a fellow teacher.
- This story serves as the context for the video series: to offer the support and clarity she lacked.

Vision for the Series

- The course is designed to help new teachers launch with intention and confidence.
- The emphasis is on long-term preparation and forming sustainable habits in the first year.
- Topics covered will move from classroom setup and routines to discipline, curriculum, and parent partnership.
- The goal: help new teachers avoid burnout and establish restful rhythms from the start.

Immediate Steps for New Teachers

- Learn your school's mission—know it, internalize it, return to it in hard moments.
- Ask for a mentor—don't assume you'll be guided; seek out someone wise and willing.
- Start planning now—lay out your classroom, organize your materials, and think through how you want your year to feel.
