Dewey Compared to Other Philosophers

- Plato
 - The human being must actively seek rational comprehension of the eternal and transcendent essence of reality in order to lead a moral life, conduct oneself with intelligence in public affairs, and in order to have any genuine knowledge of anything.

• Aristotle

- He developed the "first systematic treatment of the principles of correct reasoning..."
- He believed that teaching and habit were necessary for education, and consequently, the flourishing of the human being.





• Rousseau

- He believed that social institutions, and culture in general, corrupted the inherent goodness of the human being.
- He advocated for an education according to nature, respecting the autonomy of the child.
- Dewey
 - He believed that human existence is primarily biological and social with engagement in specific problems and objectives.
 - He believed that education is "growth".
 - He believed that results determine truth.
 - He believed that education has social value and function.
