## **Outline**:

Assessment Practices (Setting the Bar)

- Grade credit depends heavily on tests and/or quizzes little to no credit for homework; no credit for corrections.
- Weekly quizzes (grades 7-9)
  - Use weekly quizzes instead of chapter tests.
  - Chapter tests cause cramming for material.
  - Weekly quiz gives opportunity to assess more frequently.
  - The more frequently students are assessed, the more the content is placed in the long term memory.
  - In grade 10, it is appropriate to switch to chapter tests.
  - After the first couple quizzes students learn how to pace themselves.
    Sometimes give an extra five minutes on the quiz.
  - Any content that has been completed by Friday is fair game for quizzes in the following weeks.
- Cumulative assessments
  - This is the heart and soul the whole mastery paradigm.
  - If students are on the hook for studying old material, then they will remember it.
  - The old material on the assessment can range between 25% 50%. This includes questions on computations and written responses.
- Structure assessments to fit the developmental level of students.
  - 7<sup>th</sup>-9<sup>th</sup> Weekly Cumulative Quiz
  - $\circ$  10<sup>th</sup> 12<sup>th</sup> Chapter Exams, Interim Quizzes, Standard Problems List
    - Students need to learn to sit for chapter exams, longer exams.
    - Do six chapter exams per semester.
    - Chapter exams are cumulative in nature.
    - In between chapter exams give 1-2 interim quizzes (5-7 minutes long). These quizzes are just on what has been done in the past 3-4 days.
    - Students are held accountable for keeping up in the class.
    - Interim quizzes give a student a snapshot of their preparation for the test.
    - Take all the interim quizzes and average them together or a grade equivalent to a chapter test.
