Anchoring discussions to texts ensures depth and fidelity in both formats.

Socratic Seminar in Group Settings

Diverse Mistakes as Learning Opportunities

- Students make varied errors, which fosters collective correction and learning.
- Peer correction encourages critical thinking and deeper engagement.

Focus on Textual Anchoring

- Constant return to the text ensures fidelity to the original material.
- Questions like "Is that what Plato says?" promote textual analysis and accuracy.

One-on-One Socratic Conversations

• Enhanced Depth of Exploration

- Engaging with one student allows for in-depth exploration of ideas.
- Conversations become a focused "dance" or dialectic centered on the text.

Historical Precedent

 Socratic dialogues typically involved only two or three participants.



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- One-on-one discussions mirror the intensity and focus of these classic dialogues.
- Unique Value Compared to Group Seminars
 - One-on-one discussions allow deeper personal intellectual growth.
 - They can surpass the benefits of group seminars by tailoring the discussion to the individual.



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
